

YOUTH SERVICE

This year the Youth Service Committee was very much aware of the importance of assisting our local youth in their achievements. With this in view the Club has been involved in the following activities:

1. Cottage by the Sea, Queenscliff

We have continued to support the Cottage by contributing \$300 to finance one child's holiday and by assisting in the running of their annual fair. In addition, each group of children that comes to the Cottage has been taken on an excursion during which have visited Finnigan's Zoo and Koombahla Park. At the Park they all have a horse ride, a trailer ride pleasure that these visits give to the children is shown in their letters and drawings of the zoo animals and horses.

The bus, zoo and horse activities together with volunteer horse handlers are provided by members and ladies of our Club.

2. National Science Summer School, Canberra, 1986

The Club sponsored the attendance at the National Science Summer School of Georgina Jones, a Year 11 student at Queenscliff High School. In a later address to the Club, Georgina described the value of the experience in further stimulating her interest in science and the pleasure she gained in meeting other students at the School.

3. RYLA

The Club had two nominations for attendance at the Glenormiston Agricultural College for the youth leadership camp. namely Paul Tavena and Tony Hudson. Unfortunately, Paul withdrew because of a knee injury. Tony spoke to the Club and described the experience as very worthwhile and rewarding, not only from what he learnt but also the friendships that were formed. He urged the Club to endeavour to sponsor at least one person each year for this valuable training.

4. Neighbourhood House, Queenscliff

The Club supported the establishment of this neighbourhood house with a donation of \$200. Mrs. Doreen Sullivan spoke to the Club about the proposal and emphasised the importance of this facility in catering for various aspects of child and youth activities which at present were missing from the Queesncliff-Point Lonsdale area.

FUND RAISING

Once more this year the Club lacked a major fund raising activity although there were a number of functions which produced good returns. We believe it is imperative that members acknowledge the need to support all of our activities and to propose ideas for generating revenue. There appears a general lack of assistance to this Committee from members - many suggestions but little follow-up or a willingness to see a thought through to the viable stage.

What should be the correct procedure? We suggest Directors and their Committees should set out goals and decide on projects; give a rough costing of their expectations, then the Club should raise the money by the Fund Raising Committee organising functions with the assistance of club members. In addition, members should encourage the public more to attend our functions, otherwise we continually rely on our own members for financing every endeavour. If there is a poor response within the Club to a function after the go-ahead has been agreed to, the Committee becomes disillusioned.

Some good ideas have been proposed this year, but this committee requires assistance and a commitment from the originator in order to produce a viable activity. For example, Frank Mountford has successfully negotiated with the Shire of Bellarine over the last six months with a view to planning an Ocean Grove market, this project now appears a viable proposal.

Despite the general disappointment of the Committee this year, there have been a number of successful and pleasant functions, for example the Fashion Parade, Roast on a Spit, Trots Night.

We thank the members who made them worthwhile.

ROTARY FOUNDATION SCHOLARSHIP

Late last year an applicant for overseas study was interviewed and found to be unsuitable for this scholarship.

This year we have had one early applicant, who has since withdrawn his application. He does however intend to apply again next year.

STUDENT EXCHANGE:

This has been a joint venture by the International and Youth Committees. We are currently hosting a very pleasant and well mannered girl - Ros Orr from U.S.A. Counsellor Roy Rose believes Ros has fitted in well and has made many friends in her own quiet way.

We received nine applications from students in our Rotary area, for overseas student exchange during 1987. Our selected student Martyne Christie is currently in the midst of undergoing the District selection procedure, and everyone involved is confident of her gaining District approval.

MATCHED CLUB:

Contact with the Rotary Club of Salzgitter - Wolfenbüttel continued during this year. Henry Hudson and Graeme and Bonnie Bath visited our friends in West Germany in 1985. were given a tremendous welcome and gratefully accepted the hosting of a very hospitable Club. We sent to P.P. Heinz Tonn a video cassette entitled "Geelong - The Golden Opportunity" which was prepared by the Geelong Regional Commission. In the last SW communication we were told this documentary will be viewed "at the end of Germany's summertime" in August by which time cable TV will be installed in Haydnstrasse and a VHS equipment will be set up by Heinz in his home.

ESSAYS FOR PEACE:

Our Club supported the District Governor's suggestion to encourage students to write appropriate "Peace" letters to national and international figures. P.P. Frank Mountford, Principal, Queenscliff High School collected a number from his School. A committee selected Jasmyne Jackson's effort as the winner for which she received a \$50 prize. This essay has since been forwarded to the District Governor for assessment with other offerings from the District.

VOCATIONAL SERVICE

Vocational Service highlights the responsibility of Rotarians to the second of the four objects of Rotary which is:

"To encourage and foster high ethical standards in business and the professions, the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations; and the dignifying by each Rotarian of his occupation as an opportunity to serve society."

In 1985 - 86 this was supported by a discussion night on the difficult ethical questions faced by several occupations represented in our Club. The evening was well received and should be considered again in 1986 - 87.

The Club members also demonstrated to the Year 11 students at Queenscliff High School the worthiness of useful occupations by giving mock interviews on Tuesday, 15 October. A highlight of this year's interviews was the participation of the ladies and the feedback from the students was excellent.

The 4-way test - the significance of this basic tenet of Rotary is emphasised to the new members and existing members at every induction.

COMMUNITY SERVICE

As a relatively 'young' Rotarian who was suddenly 'hijacked' to the position of Community Service Director (acting) for the last six months of the year, I find the task of reporting on the year's activities almost as daunting as the position itself!

However, the following is a summary:

1. Community Service Club Shed

Yes, as predicted in the last Annual Report, the Shed is now operating, although not completed and Rotary has assisted with the erection and concreting. Rotary also assisted the Committee of Management with the holding of an Auction at the shed to raise funds for the shed (\$1,500). The remaining tasks of sewerage and interior lining and partitions will be commenced in due course.

2. Grubb Road Walking Track

Certainly our most noteworthy achievement for the year has been the work done on the walking/cycling track along Grubb Road from the Nature Reserve to Thacker Street. Almost 2 km of track has been formed and the remaining 1 km should be completed before the end of June. Of course there will be further spreading of grit later in the year after the track has consolidated. This project has provided an excellent opportunity for Rotarians to work together and achieve a most worthwhile facility for our community.

Working along Grubb Road certainly vindicated the project as most necessary - the volume and speed of traffic is quite frightening! The support and co-operation of the Shire of Bellarine has enabled us to not only provide the track but has beautified this main approach to our town and provided a most desirable fire-break between the road and the Nature Reserve/woodlands.

3. Ocean Grove Community Festival

Our Club was represented on the organizing Committee and was responsible for the organization and marshalling of the Procession. The Festival was most successful and it is intended that it should be an Annual event.

4. Flinders Parade Reserve - Barwon Heads

We have had several working bees at the Reserve assisting the Barwon Heads Reserve Committee with the cleaning up and development of facilities.

Contract Fund-raising

The Disco, Annexe demolition, grass-cutting, etc. have assisted individuals in the community and provided funds for the operation of our Club.

6. Fishing Competition/Campers B.B.Q's

Unfortunately, these activities although worthwhile, were financially unsuccessful.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

I have had a very interesting and rewarding year observing a young club with a wide variety of members reaching towards an identity. I hope I can take some credit for assisting the maturation process.

In comparing "the Club plans and objectives" with our achievements for this year we have had a very productive year of which a new club can be proud. To me, the third year of our Club was to be a time for consolidation; to involve an examination of what being a Rotarian really means. The glitter of being new has worn off and the facts and responsibilities of being members of a Rotary Club had to be faced. For this reason, the implications of this year's theme "You are the Key", had particular relevance for all of us. Harold Nicol and Ian Hawthorne told us their thoughts and impressions of Rotary, the former from many years of active Rotary experience and service, the latter as a sensitive member of society outside Rotary. I believe each person made us reflect and examine our motives and obligations - perhaps some of us did not like what we heard. If we had a positive reaction to the comments, the Club will benefit and become a constructive, thoughtful Club with a healthy, friendly image in the community and within Rotary.

We have made many advances in Rotary activities this year. For the first time the Club:

- (a) hosted an exchange student;
- (b) is prepared to sponsor an outgoing exchange student;
- (c) sponsored student participation in the National Science Summer School;
- (d) interviewed an applicant for a Rotary Foundation Scholarship;
- (e) sponsored a candidate for RYLA.

In addition these commitments have continued: involvement with Cottage by the Sea (thanks to Trevor McArdle, Robin Lamperd and David Cooke), interest in Probus (congratulations to Graham Bath), (it is proposed to sponsor another Probus Club) matched German Club, breakfast meetings (were appreciated by visitors), "interviews" at Queenscliff High School.

In general, our meetings have been of a high standard, largely due to the continued excellence in selection of our speakers (thank you Wal Briggs) - perhaps at times there was too much talk and not enough action. Controversy has occurred at times, notably the South African question, autonomy in Rotary, membership for women - a new club has privileges - one being to examine the tenets of the organisation. Is it necessary to each week have a "dinner"

meeting? Why not once a month a "supper" meeting? Dennis Wootten has faithfully recorded our meetings in an excellent Bulletin - thank you Dennis.

I wish to congratulate the Community Service committee and sincerely thank David Tyrrell for taking over the Directorship at a difficult time. Our involvement in community affairs has strengthened considerably. Alan Kilpatrick's idea to stimulate the development of the Ocean Grove Community Centre and catalyse the Ocean Grove community into action by establishing a reserve fund within the Shire of Bellarine should ensure the building of the Community Hall within 5 years. We hope the Ocean Grove Market becomes a fruitful source of funds - Frank Mountford and his committee have accepted this challenge, we are optimistic of the results.

Where did we fail this year? Two areas - attendance and increase in membership. Although I firmly believe we need "quality not quantity", nevertheless to be viable our Club must show growth. Each member has a serious obligation to the Club to attend meetings and invite suitable men to join Rotary. I urge all members to seriously examine the potential for membership in our community.

I am sure we have learnt a great deal from our first experience in this important aspect of Rotary. We wish Ros good health, happiness and success in her future life and hope her sojourn in Australia will be remembered with delight.

Our "Ladies of Rotary" have supported our Club throughout the year by raising funds and assisting in activites. "Ladies nights" are an important avenue for welding the Club together and demonstrating that Rotary is a worthwhile organisation for all. To the ladies in general, please accept my sincere thanks. To the most important lady of all, my wife Isabel, thank you very sincerely for your efforts and support during this year.

In conclusion, to my successor, John Calnin and his wife Nan, my best wishes for 1986-87 and good luck for the year ahead.
