SUNDAY MARKET

As last year, our main Community Service project for this year was our Sunday Market. The markets were very successful which was in a large part due to moving the sites of our stalls closer to the treed area of the reserve nearer the ammenities block. The existing tracks and trees in this area provide a good market setting as well as improved shelter for stallholders, who were pleased with the move. Good market publicity and weather also assisted this years markets. An extra market held in January to take advantage of local holidaymakers was well patronised and will probably be repeated next year. The Rotary food and drink van was a much needed improvement to our market ammeneties appreciated by public and stallholders alike. by public and stallholders alike.

Our members activities at the markets, including site rentals, cray spins (including those held on three Saturday mornings in Ocean Grove shopping area) and food van sales netted the club around \$4,800.00 profit after all expenses.

I would like to thank all club members who helped on this project , and would like to express my appreciation to Market Committee chairman Frank Mountford, organiser of food van and supplies John Calnin and Dennis Wooteen who assisted with stallholder registrations and attended every market.

OCEAN GROVE COMMUNITY FESTIVAL

Our club again assisted with the organisation of the Festival procession and thanks to the efforts of this sub committee headed by Colin Brown and members all went smoothly.

ROTARY DIALYSIS CENTRE APPEAL

In late November the combined Rotary Clubs of the Geelong region were involved in a fund raising campaign which raised \$165,000.00 to be used to refurbish and equip an existing building attached to the Geelong Hospital for use as a local Kidney Dialysis Zentre. The centre will be known as the Geelong Hospital Rotary Dialysis Unit. Although not many of our members were involved our club was represented at four or five committee meetings and called on some prospective donors for this appeal.

BOWELSCAN

Another Geelong region combined Rotary Clubs community service project was the Bowelscan 88 program. This bowel cancer awareness program was co ordinated by Belmont Rotary Club. Our club supplied over seven hundred test kits in the communities of Ocean Grove, Barwon Heads, Queenscliff and Point Lonsdale. Three sales locations covering these towns were open four days. The assistance of members of Probus Clubs of Ocean Grove and Point Lonsdale/Queenscliff, The Catholic Church at Ocean Grove and our own ladies and members who took part was much appreciated and essential to the success of this worthy community project.

VOCATIONAL SERVICE REPORT:

D. J. CLAYTON, DIRECTOR; EGIL ABRAHMSEN; JOHN GUTHRIE; JOHN WYNN; ROY ROSE:

The Vocational Service Committee arranged JOB INTERVIEWS at the Queenscliff High School, to provide young people with experience in applying for their future employment. The interviews were conducted by Senior Rotarians, with assistance from mebers of the Probus Club, and proved to be of valuable experience to future job applicants.

Vocational Month was recognised by a visit to the Ford Motor Company, where members of our Club enjoyed a tour of the Ford Plant and a commentary by Rotarian Alex Hand. The funds raised contributed to Rotary funds.

Our Committee provided two speakers who spoke on their particular Vocation. Professor Les Lomas, Dean of the Faculty of Education at Deakin University spoke on the future trends in Education and it's relationship to Commerce and the Workforce in general. Dr. Allan Gould, a Scientist with the Australian National Animal Health Laboratory, delivered an interesting address on his vocation, and how the work carried out at the Laboratory is designed to protect the health of the Australian live-stock population.

During the year, several of our Club members gave interesting talks on their vocation and their earlier lives. It gave us an opportunity to learn about our friends occupations, the value of their work, their families, their strengths and their failures, in other words we know and understand our friends better - well done Boys!!!

Our final project was to arrange, in conjunction with members of the Ocean Grove Traders' Association, a "KNOW YOUR LOCAL TRADER" Competition a competition to match employers photos with their place of employment(or business). This project will be completed during July, and is expected to raise approx. \$800-\$1,000 for Rotary funds.
