Guest Speaker: 15 on Me. Paul Brewster.

Paul introduced his chat by telling us he was a 10 Pound Pom who travelled thousands of miles and got married!

This journey commenced in North West London around 1960. Like most lads of that time, he needed to earn money and for Paul it was by doing a paper round, even in the snow to pay for his road racing bike. At this time, he was a student at Christ's College Finchley where the headmaster had been in that position since 1929! A school assignment in 1960 required research



about one of the states of Australia. He chose Queensland. His Mother and Father helped with the research which included a trip to Australia House. Unknown to Paul his parents were thinking about moving from London, perhaps to Kenya, but the information about Australia intervened and it became the preferred option. Sponsors were required for assisted immigration as well as tentative employment. Temporary accommodation was found in Newtown, Geelong and employment was included in the employment opportunities. There was lots of paperwork, medicals, vaccinations as well decisions about what to leave and what to pack into tea chests. The family was booked on a ship, but they were asked to consider flying. That was preferable (with 3 children), and about a week later after very hurried disposal of furniture and other residue they left England on 28th October 1963. They flew on a QANTAS 707 refuelling at New York, San Francisco, Honolulu, Fiji arriving in Sydney. Another flight to Melbourne and a red rattler to Geelong.

The family rented a house in Belmont where they encountered out native fauna, a Huntsman spider!

It took a few years to get established, with his father working at International Harvester and 'Bodycraft' and eventually Ford Motor Company, where he was paying more in tax than he was in London. Several relatives emigrated during these years and lived close by. Paul commenced a "preparatory" year to the Architecture course at the Gordon while his sisters completed their schooling.

Paul worked during the holidays to pay his fees the following year. At the Gordon the 'Arkies', as they were known were responsible for social activities. At the end of year 3, through hard work, a bit of subterfuge and good luck he and two other students had their required drawing portfolios for Architectural Design, Building Construction and Graphics accepted and then 3 years part time study began. Yunken Freeman Architects were his employers for 13 years. For the first three years he was working full time and attending night classes three times a week. It was 'pretty tough'.

During this time Paul was rotated around most areas the firm was involved in, including hydraulics design, and with the experience gained he was appointed manager of the Commercial Interior Design Department. By this time, he was doing another years study to gain his degree in Architecture. He ultimately became a Contract Administrator, one of a team of four who went on site to do inspections, issue instructions, and keep an eye on the financial side of things. Diplomacy was quickly learnt especially during the construction of BHP House. About this time Paul obtained two tickets for the final dinner of the Gas and Fuel Mrs Victoria Quest. After an ask around amongst the group, Jan said yes, she would accompany him. They changed into their finery in the toilets at work and looking very 'acceptable' they attended the dinner which was a bit of a disaster. Their relationship, however blossomed and the rest is history.

Following two other appointments Paul joined the Target Head Office as a store planner, doing a job which didn't really suit him. Through contacts he was offered a position with Yunken and Freeman as Office Manager and Project Manager for the Regent of Auckland. This required living in New Zealand, so with their house in Stinton Avenue under renovation the family moved to Auckland for about 2 years. The project was completed, and the family moved back to Geelong. Paul became the Site Architect for Bay City Plaza 1986-1988.

From then until retirement, Christian College has been his place of employment as Bursar initially then as the College expanded from 150 students to 2000 students, he became Builder and Project Manager. During this time there was \$60 million spent on work for the College. Paul and Jan have three children, Catherine and Stephen who have had experiences in Japan, Stephen has a Japanese wife and daughter. Alison, a 'change' baby has a daughter.

Paul joined Rotary in 200. He became an Australian citizen in 2017 (after 54 years). His two sisters are living in Victoria.

Paul completed his talk by stating that he is "now officially retired and enjoying life with Jan. I am convinced that education is the key to the survival of the human race and the preservation of the planet. Is it a coincidence that I married a teacher and all 3 of our children are teachers of some kind or another? I hope to contribute to education through Rotary now instead of an educational institution."

"Thank you for welcoming Mum, Dad and my sisters to Australia and paying the expenses involved through your taxes. I like to think that we've made a contribution to Australia, and I hope you think you've got your money's worth."


