Junji's enthusiasm to learn English is being nurtured by Mrs Olive Mason, Point Lonsdale; he attends her home for weekly lessons. Junji was a popular member of the international students group that journeyed to Central Australia recently. In addition, the Club will sponsor an out-going student in 1991. We had three applicants for the position. Macgregor Haines of Ocean Grove has been selected and accepted by the District Committee. Macgregor attends Geelong College. He will be visiting Indonesia, leaving Australia in January 1992.

Group Study Exchange

A number of our members hosted ladies from Japan who were members of the first womens Group Study Exchange Team from that country. A very interesting meeting was held in the South Barwon Centre hall, when all the visitors spoke.

Thailand

The project to fight illiteracy in Thailand has been strongly supported by our Club. However there has been no feed-back regarding the success or present status of the program.

COMMUNITY SERVICE

1990 - 1991

Initially, the primary function of the Community Service Committee was the Club's commitment to the DIABETES EDUCATION Centre. The financial commitment over three years was expected to be about \$6000.00. However, if we decided to find this amount in one year then the amount to be raised would have been about \$5000.00 and the balance would come from interest earned on the funds. Considerable work was undertaken by Henry Hudson, Roy Rose and myself and a couple of other Rotarians. The document to be put to the Club and to other sources of funds (ie: Rotary Clubs, business and local Government) was almost completed when the Pyramid crisis and the general economic downturn in the Geelong area hit us causing the project to be put on hold.

There were a number of "carry-over" projects that we continued to be involved in again this year. These included assistance to Cottage-by-the-Sea, Red Cross, Ocean Grove Festival, Walk against Want, Queenscliff & District Health Centre. The Committee had hoped that apart from these activities listed that the Club would embrace an activity that was relevant only to this Rotary Year. Such an activity was not on the horizon at the beginning of the Rotary Year and I regret to report that a particular activity was not identified by the year's end.

The major fund raising activity was the Rotary Market. Another successful year as the Market becomes firmly identified with the local area. The Market Sub-Committee under Rod Birrell did a tremendous job.

The Bellarine Gift was suspended in 1991 due to a lack of sponsorships. The Pyramid collapse and the general economic climate contributed to the problems of staging this event. The Club in Assembly has considered the matter and the general feeling is that the return does not warrant the time and effort spent.

Assistance to the Ocean Grove Foreshore Committee in clearing the Foreshore continued although at a reduced level from previous years.

The Club was involved in the Bellarine Love Affair Festival and assisted at the Ocean Grove Festival. Non financial assistance was organized for the Aged Peoples Home in Ocean Grove.

The Club sponsored two new Probus Clubs, which were formed to cater for the large response from eligible people. One of the Clubs is the Combined Probus Club of Ocean Grove and the other is Combined Probus - Four Villages. Thanks to Roy Rose and Graham Bath for their efforts in getting the new Probus Clubs up and running.

Programme 1990/91

1. Classification

3. Tour of Work Place

Rotarian Ian Stewart arranged a tour of the Queenscliffe Fort including an evening meal and address by Brigadier Jim Townley AM.

4. Combined Service Club Meeting

Rotarian Phil Butters prepared a most successful evening where representatives of Lions, Apex and Ladies of Lions outlined their year's projects. The meeting was addressed by the Mayor of the Rural City of Bellarine, Councillor Bernie Knight.

5. Simulated Job Interviews Program - Queenscliff High School

Rotarian Ken Thibou in conjunction with careers teacher, Terri Scott prepared a comprehensive "at the workplace" interviewing program involving 140+ students, 18 Rotarians and 2 Ladies of Rotary.

6. Tour of Work Place

Rotarian Alan Joyce organized a most enlightening visit to the Geelong Crematorium where Ian Keith conducted a comprehensive tour.

7. IPAC - International Projects Advisory Committee

Bob Osbourne recommended that the Vocational Committee adopt IPAC Project 21 88/89 as an International Project with the Rotary Club of Sawankaloke, Thailand in providing Scholarships to needy Thai children. The sum of \$200.00 was donated.

8. Rotary Market

Committee members regularly assisted with the market to encourage local craftspeople to sell their ware and also to raise money for further Rotary Projects.

Members of the Vocational Committee feel they have upheld Rotary's 1990/91 International Theme "Honor Rotary with Faith and Enthusiasm" by providing opportunities for Rotarians to thank "VOCATIONAL".

PRESIDENTS REPORT

1990 - 1991

I am grateful to the Directors for their proper attitude in the guidance of this great Club and for their assistance and support to me in the conduct of Club affairs and activities..

My grateful thanks go also to Geoff Brentnall (Secretary), Bob Perry (Treasurer), Colin Brown (Attendance), Peter Fraser (Bulletin), Dennis Wootten (Programme), David Tyrrell (Sergeant-at-Arms), David Cooke (Fellowship/Social), Ian Walker (Property).

Supporting all the Rotarians abovementioned were individual Club members in Committees and Sub-Committees. I am grateful to them for their particular contribution to the successful running of Club matters. Thank you Rotarians.

Rob Birrell and his Market Sub-Committee performed with a great dedication and much success. A brief report is attached.

A Bowlescan project was again a part of our contact with the community this year. As usual, Eric Bare directed operations and as we have come to learn from past years, Eric only believes in and achieves positive, successful results. I would like to record the message from PP Ted Wooles, Co-ordinator: 'The support provided by Moyra McArdle, Eric and Noelene Bare in the analysis program is much appreciated'. The Club also applauds your efforts.

The various Directors have reported on events and activities within their own Service. The reports are attached. Taken as a whole, it will be obvious to all that, in one way or another, the Club had a very successful and full year. This happened despite the Pyramid collapse, the horrific economic situation in the Geelong region and nationwide, and each Rotarian's natural concern for his own family, employment and livelihood. I warmly commend Rotarians for their dedication to the Club and their continuing generosity in effort, time and resources, during this period. It is in periods of adversity that a Club shows its true mettle.

I will now review some highlights with only brief comment.

Community Service flew among Clubs in the District a pilot scheme for a Diabetes Education Centre. Initial intensive work was by Henry Hudson and Geoff Morphet. On hold for the moment. Cottage-by-the-Sea, Red Cross, Ocean Grove Festival, Queenscliff and District Community Health Centre, Hospice, Ocean Grove Foreshore Committee, the Bellarine Love Affair, Subaru Classic, two new Probus Clubs and other areas received Club support and/or financial assistance.

International Youth Exchange saw Jodie Disney arrive home from a successful year in South Africa, and the arrival from Japan of Junji Hatanaka for a twelve months stay with us. The out-going student for 1992 is Macgregor Haines and he will be placed in Indonesia. Passing through was the first ever Womens Group Study Exchange from Japan. Graham Bath has maintained links with our matched Club Salzgitter-Wolfenbuttel of Germany.

Youth Month was very well conceived and the response from both Rotarians and the young people was quite encouraging. The theme of assistance to Youth was a continuing one throughout the year and I am pleased to be able to record

No major projects were started this year but two are in the pipe-line and hopefully will be started when we get permission from the relevant authorities -

1. A Rotary park around the lake/wetlands near Surfside. A group of local citizens have set up a steering committee to manage the area. I am on this committee.
2. The beautification of the surrounds of the Community Centre.

1. Geelong Central's Tree Planting Day.
2. The Clean-up Australia Day.
3. The pulling of Bellarine Pea on the Foreshore.
4. We provided marshalls for the Subaru Classic.
