9. Finally there is the exciting pilot project of providing public access defibrillators around our town. Thanks to the dedication of Wal and commitment of his committee and many Rotarians, the first defibrillator has been installed in Market Place Shopping Centre. Most of the cost was covered by donations and the Club has covered the cost of the case and signage. We now have 3 units in Ocean Grove with a target of 8 to 10 units.

This is an on-going project commitment with dedicated funding and it is envisaged that we will take this pilot project to District Convention next year. Without claiming credit, I see the level 2 first aid course that was organized by David Tyrrell as being an excellent community service that complements our PAD project. -25 people participated, and Rotary paid for one young person.

The attached financial report lists in detail the financial contributions made to various community causes.

I would like to acknowledge and thank my committee and all Rotarians who have enabled the completion of the above projects.

MARKET REPORT

Chairperson: Judy Greer

Due to the excellent organisation of Past Market Chairman Tony Haines and the superb computer skills of Rod Bush, not to mention the willingness of all Rotarians to fulfil rostered duties our 2005-2006 Market Season got off to a great start in the absence of the incoming chairman and her assistant.

This year we held 8 markets – October to April and Easter Monday (mid April). Weather conditions were generally very favourable for the entire season with only the New Year's Day market coming to an early close with the arrival of rain. For the first half of the season mosquitoes were our biggest concern and our repellent supplies were in demand. Fortunately they abated after the January market.

The season's statistics were very similar to those of 2004/2005. Stalls averaged 74 per market. The Easter Market was very successful with 117 sites occupied. Vehicles averaged approximately 700 per market. Income from site bookings and the Raffle amounted to \$16,483. The Cray Spins at four markets and the Meat Spin at Easter raised an average of \$350 after expenses.

A new approach using teams under a team leader, who was automatically a member of the Market Committee, was introduced this season and proved to work effectively. Teams were responsible for the range of duties needed to be carried out to ensure the successful operation of each market. Thanks to Team Leaders who worked with their team members to see that the aspect of the market for which they were responsible was taken care of. The Market Committee plans to continue this form of market management for the 2006/2007 season.

- Tony Haines and Rod Bush and others of the management team in assisting Rod and I in taking on the market management role. Your expertise was greatly appreciated.
- Colin Brown and his team for their excellent car park management.
- Leigh Holloway and the Site Preparation team for marking out the sites for each market.
- Alison George and her band of sales personnel for promoting the Stall Holders Raffle and the Mitre 10 Raffle. Special thanks to Rtn. John and Prue Webb for their continued generosity in sponsoring the Mitre 10 Raffle.
- Rod Birrell and his assistants for attending to the placement of signs and witches hats and for the erecting and dismantling of the tent so efficiently.
- Tim Kemp, who has organised the popular Cray and Meat Spins, and his support crew.
- Past Rotarian Judy Mills and her very willing successors, Marion and Bill Walton, for looking after our advertising.

What a great year Ocean Grove Rotary has enjoyed particularly in the area of Community Service achievements!

Thanks must go to the committee, Rotarians and those who have taken responsibility for specific projects.

I do believe that unlike many roles in Rotary, Community Service requires two years to get projects up, running and completed.

Whilst members are well aware of the projects completed during the year, I list them in this report for a record of our Clubs' achievements:-

1. The Barwon Heads Bluff walkway and board-walk. Very much a hands on project – 300 mt. of shell-grit pathway, 100 mt. of elevated boardwalk and a viewing platform along one of the most magnificent sections of the coast. Several hundred man-hours with materials and planning provided by Barwon Coast. Thanks Warren! This has provided a lasting legacy to Rotary.
2. Tree planting and fencing below the Ocean Grove lookout. 100 trees to celebrate 100 years of Rotary.
3. Red Cross Calling collection- Not popular but worthwhile.
4. Anzac Day breakfast – Thanks to John Calnin it is growing each year.
5. Outdoor table and seating at Mirrabooka. Thanks to Leigh and Rod for the preparation.
6. The Rotary Shopfront at Market Place. With Wal Kelly doing the negotiations we have enjoyed the use of a prime shop for displaying our community involvement and demonstrating the use of the defibrillator. Rotarians painted this new shop internally and furnished it sparingly with television and DVD player.
7. The provision of seating at Ocean Grove lookout and the Bluff board-walk to acknowledge the contributions of volunteers in our communities.
8. There were also a number of other projects where we provided assistance and manpower. Of course Rotarians also contributed significant time manning the markets and selling raffle tickets (or rather assisted Geoff Ford!). There were a number of aborted projects that involved considerable resources by Rotarians including the Memorial Garden at the lookout Reserve (Geoff Chandler) and the Rotunda and BBQ at Tuckfield St. Reserve.
