Many local groups assisted with equipment and manpower and our thanks go to them. Our own good ladies ensured that hospitality was second to none.


OCEAN GROVE COMMUNITY FESTIVAL

Our final donation for this year was \$300.00, given to "Jirralinga Wildlife Sanctuary" in Barwon Heads.

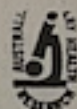
Finally, thank you to all Ladies for your friendship, help and support during the year.



1988/89.

The club has operated very well this year overall and a large part of this success must be attributed to President Hans who has led the club with energy and enthusiasm and has displayed great leadership ability at all times. I believe the club has grown substantially in stature and experience during the past year and can now take a great deal of pride in its achievements and standing in the local community and within the realm of Rotary itself.

The "newer" members of one and two year's service have taken up the challenge particularly well and have become fine Rotarians. Together with the solid support of the more experienced members they now form the nucleus of a very solid and sound club and this augers well for the future of Rotary in Ocean Grove. It is important that we sustain this growth within the members and the club over the next twelve months and thus build on the fine foundation already established.

YOUTH EXCHANGE STUDENT

Incoming - Our visitor from Brazil, Sergio Maura was well looked after for the remainder of his stay before being farewelled at a barbecue at President Hans' residence in January. All Host Rotarians should be thanked for their hospitality. Once again everybody involved benefited in many ways from Sergio's visit.

Outgoing - Local girl Jodie-Anne Disney, a year 11 student at Queenscliff High School, was chosen from five applicants in April to represent our club at Horsham & Hall's Gap in June when district selection for students going overseas in 1990 will take place. If Jodie is successful she will require financial assistance from the club. The club could be helped in this regard by funds available from the Kim Windmill - Sarah Jelderks Memorial Trust.

WORLD COMMUNITY SERVICE

In November the club catered for a one day equestrian event at Koombalah Park at which exchange student Sergio competed with distinction. Despite inclement weather \$374 was raised.

To assist the Drysdale Rotary Club, in its collection of tools for a practical classroom at Martyrs' Memorial School at Popondetta, Papua-New Guinea, a bench top drill press was purchased at a subsidized price of \$179 from Ocean Grove Hardware (thank you, David Clayton). At a December meeting the drill press was formally presented to Mike Lawton of the Drysdale Rotary Club who was able to give the club some interesting information about the Popondetta project. The balance of \$195 raised at Koombalah Park was earmarked for Rotary Foundation.

In April an International Dinner was held at the Ocean Grove Tennis Club. Among the guests were four visiting exchange students - Lisa Gacloch from U.S.A., (hosted by Corio Rotary Club), Ulf Habebwalz from West Germany (hosted by Geelong Rotary Club), Panarat Chantim (Ying) from Thailand (hosted by West Geelong rotary Club), and Mark Ellfers from U.S.A. (hosted by Drysdale). All present enjoyed the International cuisine provided by our ladies and many entered into the spirit of the occasion by dressing in the National Costume of various parts of the world. It was a successful social event which raised approximately \$200 for World Community Service. In November our club decided to support I.P.A.C. project 72 - 1988/89 which would have involved the donation of Basic English reading material to a library in Salyanathan Village, a model village in Nepal set up by the Rotary club of Kathmandu. It has since been indicated to us that an alternative form of support would be preferred. We are investigating the best way of providing this.

In November the District Governor's representative on Rotary Foundation, Ken Carr and John Brumley, addressed the club on all aspects of the Foundation.

The ideals of vocational service are to:

1. Promote the highest ethical standards.
2. Recognise the usefulness of all occupations.
3. Contribute vocational skills to the problems and needs of society.

To achieve this the club has fostered and developed projects which highlight vocational talents. These projects have been directed at specific areas.

In The Rotary Club

- Job talks by new members which has assisted in their introduction to fellow members and improved our understanding of other vocations.
- Site visit to the Rolling Pin Pie Shop. This allowed us to observe both production and consumption skills.
- Vocational service scorecard. This provided each member with an opportunity for self appraisal. The reports that were returned for the survey indicated a positive attitude existing from the vocational point of view.

In The Work Place

- The know your trader presentation of awards was the result of a joint project with the Traders Association. It was designed to foster good service from the Trading community to the public.
- Jane Wilson spoke to us on the management of stress.
- Rodney McLure spoke regarding business and self promotion using the written word.

To Youth

- Mock interviews with the Queenscliff High School students was another success. We endeavoured to take advantage of members skills by matching them to certain jobs being interviewed. Discussions have been held regarding work site interviews to enhance the process.

The Community

- To foster the developing tourist industry we prepared and distributed an Art and Craft tour brochure. 15000 copies were distributed to the general public to assist them identifying local business. This concept will be widened to other businesses.

The Aged

- The club has been active in establishing probus clubs and providing handyman services to the local aged.

An apprenticeship exchange project did not get started during the year; however it would be an interesting exercise that may be taken up in the new year.

6th ANNUAL REPORT

The past twelve months for the Rotary Club of Ocean Grove has seen many achievements and some disappointments but generally I feel the club is still in good working condition.

MAJOR PROJECTS COMPLETED WERE:

1. The Charter of two new Ladies Probus Clubs.
2. Completion of our Polio Plus comittement.
3. Our usual role in assisting with the Ocean Grove Community Festival was also successful, and we can only say that the inaugural Bellarine Athletics Gift was a complete success in spite of the excessively hot day.

We also saw the opening of the new Kidney Dialysis Centre in Geelong by Rotary World President Royce Abbey, followed by a dinner with members from Geelong Rotary Clubs.

Another plus for the year seemed to be our B.B.Q. meetings during January. These meetings attracted up to 40 Rotarians each meeting and although business was not as usual fellowship was excellent.

Again the Sunday Markets have been our major fundraiser for the year. These funds have enabled us to help financially many organisations and some individuals, as well as to purchase a sound system and food caravan for the club.

The donation from Mrs. Armstrong has allowed us to distribute monies to Ocean Grove Hospice, Polio Plus and Rotary Health Research Fund. Our Bellarine Athletics Gift effort added \$3,500.00 towards the Ocean Grove Hall Fund.

In December we celebrated our club's 5th Birthday with a mixed night at Mexican Graffiti. The night was attended by some Charter members and our Charter President Wally Kelly. Our Guest Speaker for the evening was Dr. John Birrell, and a very pleasant evening was had by all that were able to attend.

This Christmas the club also put together 3 Hampers for needy families on the Peninsula.

We also hosted an Exchange Student from Brazil, Sergio Maura, and I would like to thank the families who had Sergio stay in their homes, and also those who were able to show Sergio our state and Country. Special thanks to Bill and Joan Steains for their job as Student Councillors.

The Group Study Exchange Team from Missouri U.S.A. were shown around the Bellarine Peninsula. This day was followed by a combined dinner with Drysdale, Torquay, Grovedale and Ocean Grove clubs attending.

Due to a change of director for Community Service part way through the year, a report to that point in time saw the club take part in Working Bees at the Aged Care House in Ocean Grove, also our usual Working Bees at the Ocean Grove Foreshore, a fund raising effort at the Queenscliff Bicentennial Garden Day and a joint venture in November with Lions and Apex for the Community bonfire.



YOUTH COMMITTEE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

During the Rotary year 1988 - 1989 the Youth Committee became involved with the Bellarine Shire's Youth Officer Bill Linford, in an effort to discuss ways in which our club could be involved with young people now and in the future.

A number of meetings were held, both informally and formally for this purpose.

The result is that a travelling music show is to be set up through Bill Linford. The Ocean Grove Rotary will be participating by arranging a disco or live band every six weeks to commence in July for a trial period.

The Youth Committee has also looked at investigating the setting up of a Rotoract Club, already Rotarians Wal Kelly and Hedy Hudson have advised of their desire to help and act as club liason officers. A speaker from the Highton Rotary Club gave a very well presented speech on this subject.

Applications for RYLA, RYPEN and the National Science Summer School have been requested. At present we only have one applicant for the RYPEN weekend and no applicants for RYLA or the Science Summer School.

Members for the Youth Committee were involved in all aspects of the club activities during the year.

COMMUNITY SERVICE ANNUAL REPORT

The year started with lots of ideas and good intentions but, regrettably for various reasons, few saw the light of day.

Few Committee meetings were held during the year, and it is a valuable lesson for Directors of all Committees - unless regular meetings are held and commitments obtained from members, little progress will eventuate.

The one major Community Service project that was tackled was Bowelscan. At short notice help was forthcoming from our own members, their wives and members of Ocean Grove and Queenscliffe Proboscis Clubs. I am indebted to Frank Mountford for his assistance in organising the Queenscliffe end almost single handed.

We sold in excess of 600 kits and the majority of these have now been returned for testing. At this point it would also be appropriate to pass on our thanks to the chemists in the district who willingly participated in the collection scheme.

To date eight positive tests have been identified in the Ocean Grove area and these patients have been contacted by their doctors for further tests.

In summary, a year of quiet inactivity - with some hard lessons learned.
