John Calnin, Fundraising Committee:

Gordon King, Community Services

Committee: The judges for the Entry Signs
Competition have met. 60 submissions were

Janet Alexander, Footy Tipping: Gary O'Donnell is leading on 63, followed by Alan Keyse 59 and Alex Magee 58. This week's winner was Jenny Wright with 9 winners.

Guest Speaker: John Johnson, past Police Commission for Tasmania.

John joined the Victorian police force in May 1957. He was stationed at Russell Street and then the Victorian Docks where he was with the pillage prevention police. He then joined the

ACT Police covering Canberra and Jervis Bay and became Deputy Commissioner aged 41. He helped form the Australian Federal Police (AFP) becoming Deputy Commissioner of the new force. He was then appointed Commission of the Tasmanian police force. After 40 years of policing, he now lives in this area in retirement with his wife, Pat.

John gave a summary of the role of the AFP. After helping advocate for a national police force, the AFP was formed in October 1979 with an Englishman appointed as first Commissioner. It has a wide range of functions and is supported by internal scientific and computer engineering skills. As well as the Australian Capital Territory, it covers Christmas Island, Norfolk Island, the Cocos Keeling Islands, and Antarctica. It also covers financial crimes against the Federal Government, the importation of narcotic drugs, and provides protection to senior politicians and diplomats if needed. AFP members have been sent to world 'hot spots' such as Haiti, protection of the Thai-Cambodian border refugee camps during the Khmer Rouge period and African countries such as Mozambique and Liberia.




They were involved in the Ukraine aircraft crash incident helping to identify Australian victims. The financial crimes section deals with fraud and theft affecting Australian Government revenues and expenditures, enforcing foreign exchange regulations against fraudulent transactions and commodity futures trading. John provided some examples of the inventive ways the AFP have used to uncover drug imports, including the use of codes in intercepted telecommunications dialogue.

John Johnson represented Australia overseas at Interpol and United Nations policy meetings in Europe and throughout the world. He is still asked to do guest speaking functions on topics where Australia has recognised expertise, such as counterterrorism, forensic science, and gun law reform. In 1991, he was appointed Commission of Police in Tasmania and held that role for five years. There, he had to deal with internal corruption issues and the Port Arthur massacre when 35 people were murdered. This had a major impact on the local community.
