Noel, representing the OG Rotary Club and Warren have worked together with many other interested groups on this project. (This information is available on our OG Rotary web site). Working with these other groups has helped to focus Noel's ideas and design a coherent project which they are presenting tonight. Graham O'Donnell suggested the idea of working with Uni.



students, asking them to be involved and to present us with ideas.

A brochure has been printed which was distributed to all members tonight. It was suggested we have them readily available to be handed out at the OG Markets and at the football gates in Geelong when we are assisting. We definitely need to inform the local community to keep them involved, informed and on side with these new ideas and plans for the area. People will be encouraged to take ownership and feel it is their responsibility. Again, this material is all on the web site. The White Mangroves Project began in 1985 to create a leisure experience, as well as preserving the natural environment. There was an onsite visit and the idea of planting 100 trees emerged. This was completed in 2021.

Further actions for Rotary at the 100 Trees site - develop a concept master plan, define entry / exit points and fence off a car park, locate trails, picnic tables and signage positions, develop raised walkway specifications and prepare budget estimate, design landing/fishing pontoon with input from fisheries and canoe association.

WARREN CHAPMAN

Warren showed an old map of the North Barwon Heads area including Sheepwash drawn up in1990's - a community effort by the Rotary and Lions Clubs and The Foreshore Committee aligned with the Barwon Heads Association. They all worked with Parks Victoria to get funding so the community can enjoy that area.

Some of the ideas for further work are:

- 1. Barwon Heads Mangrove Walkway extension, needs \$80K to complete;
- 2. Missing link in the riverside trail in the Spit camping area;
- 3. The White Mangrove Experience Nature trails and boardwalk over mudflats to give access from 100 Trees site to the tidal channel, perhaps a pontoon for fishing, craft launching and bird watching.
- 4. A triangular section at the south end of the golf and boating car park where facilities are needed to make it easier to get to for both able and disabled people.


