

Guest Speaker: Leanne Watson.

Leanne was diagnosed with adult onset Limb Girdle Muscular Dystrophy (LGMD) when aged 42. Prior to that, she had a normal non-disabled life. She is now 57 and has been living with disability for the past 15 years. There are various forms of muscular dystrophy and it affects each person differently. It is a recessive inherited condition. 500,000



people globally have it with 1,400 in Australia. It is caused by different enzyme, protein or genetic deficiencies involving the limbs extending from our girdle or trunk. There is still speculation as to which muscles are affected, the level of severity and whether the heart/cardio and respiratory systems are involved. There is no cure and it is life-shortening. It is not MS or MND.

The social model of disability is where disability arises from one's interactions between their personal characteristics and their unsuitable environment. Twenty percent of the population have physical needs different from the majority but they still have functional capabilities. Leanne believes it is not being confined to a wheelchair that is the problem. Rather it is the lack of usable facilities which prevent the affected person from living a fairly normal life. Because society does not have such facilities or understand the needs of disabled people, life can be very difficult. Her plea is for equity through the provision of suitable facilities. Attitudes of people towards those with disabilities also creates a large barrier. For example, her husband is often spoken to over her when they are out. NDIS funding has been very welcome and necessary to providing her care. The contributions of carers, NDIS workers and friends is not recognised by society. Support for carers is vital.

Accommodation buildings need to have ramps, lifts in all multi-storied construction, mandated minimum door widths and roll-in showers and lower reception desk heights. There have been some improvements in facilities at restaurants providing lifts, automatic doors and suitable bathroom facilities. With continued



lobbying things have been progressing. Information about disabilities is becoming available through dedicated magazines, children's books, and some exposure in schools which is helping change attitudes. Technology also helps. Public transport in regional areas is still difficult.

Attitudinal change involving the removal of the biases and stigma in society that disabled people are second class, underserving or less worthy is essential. Disabled people need equity in access to employment, social functions, retail and hospitality facilities. When interacting with people with disabilities, their opinions and reactions must be sought and respected. As society becomes more accepting and accommodating, more people especially children are becoming more aware of the role of disabled people in their communities.

Leanne concluded that as a community, and as a country, we need to address our discomfort, prejudice and bias around our interactions with people with disability - it makes perfect economic and social sense.
