

YOUTH SERVICE REPORT.

Travelling Music Show.

In July our club assisted Mr. Bill Linford, Youth Officer for the Shire (now "Rural City") of Bellarine, in conducting a "Musical Performance/Dance" at the recreation Hall for the youth of the town. This was the first of six similar events held around the Bellarine Peninsula in July & August. Publicity and funding was the responsibility of the Shire and Rotarians risked hearing damage to supervise the event and sell soft drinks and snack foods. The bands appeared to be enjoyed by the young people present but the attendance figure, as at other venues, was disappointing.

Youth in Sport.

In September two local men with outstanding sporting credentials, Darren McDonald (Badminton), and Bruce Nunn (Cricket), addressed the club. They spoke about their respective sporting careers and of the positive influence their sport had had on their lives. A number of young people present as guests enjoyed the talks and hopefully found some inspiration there.

National Science Summer School.

The Club had the honour this year of sponsoring an outstanding young Lady, Natasha Cummings from Leopold in her attendance at the National Science Summer Project in January. Natasha returned to the club and gave a most impressive address on her experience. This was followed by an equally impressive written report. As a result of the impression she made in Canberra she was invited to address our district conference in Geelong, in March. Travelling Resource Centre for Youth.

Major Projects/Rotary Health.

The job of Director of Major commitments was simplified by the success of fundraising undertaken by the various directors.

One of the major projects of the past three years has been Polio Plus, an international aid project whose international significance would be difficult to underestimate. Now that Polio Plus has reached its financial objective the area of health funding has been taken over by the Australian Rotary Health Research Fund. The lump sum raised is invested, with the investment dividends being available to fund research projects. The initial projects were into Sudden Infant Death Syndrome and financing medical congresses on Muscular Dystrophy and Cot Death. The focus has changed during this triennium toward practical consideration of the aged and their environment. It was thought that the quality and usefulness of the current research projects haven't matched the preceding projects and so our financial contribution was reduced from \$1.000 last year to \$500 this year.

An exciting project on the horizon for the next three years is the possibility of the R.C.O.G. co-ordinating district 978 Rotary clubs to fund a Diabetes Centre of the Geelong Hospital. Provision of co-ordinated diabetic care is certainly less than optimal at the moment and this project could make a huge impact on the health and well being of the region. The project however comes with a hefty price tag of \$150.000 over three years.

The R.C.O.G. has undertaken to contribute to the Alzheimer's Hostel appeal at the Queenscliff Community Health Centre to the tune of \$5.000 over four years. Again this project will help plug a glaring gap in community services for the aged.

On the International scene our International exchange student Jodie Disney has gone to South Africa. The total funding was helped along by a contribution by the Windmill fund.

An interesting project again on the international scene was the Fish Farm project in Thailand.

The aim of this Literacey project was to provide food for a school, it being difficult to concentrate on classes when hungry or malnourished.

One contentious issue brought up by some directors was the tenet that directors who propose a project also be responsible for the fundraising. Personally I feel this is inappropriate as the project may involve inordinate hours of organizational work and also because of the nature of our broad based club fund raising, i.e. Markets and Bellerine Gift. If the club undertakes the Geelong Hospital Diabetes Centre project for example it would be a bit onerous for the director of that huge project to also be responsible for the fundraising.
