In October, PDG Henry Hudson and David Tyrrell visited Tonga to inspect and report on Rotary Foundation Projects in two hospitals and ascertain what future FAIM Projects could be developed. Travel expenses were provided from a Carl P. Miller Discovery Grant. An Excellent report has been prepared by our two members for the District Governor. This report specifies the problems involved with aid work in Tonga, and identifies several possible future FAIM Projects. The Rotary Foundation District 9780 Committee was again chaired by PDG Henry Hudson who co-ordinated the work of all sub-committees. PP Geoff Morphett was chairman of the sub-committee on matching grants, and PP Coral Barker was a member of the sub-committee on Group Study Exchange.

The District Governor has awarded Henry a citation in recognition of his work over many years to Rotary Foundation.

Our club's international project to provide a washing machine to a Zimbabwe hospital attracted a matching grant of Foundation Funds.

Several members met the visiting Group Study Exchange team from Scotland at a welcoming dinner in Geelong and at the District Council.

Our Bulletin Editor, Denis Joseph has given the club good coverage in the bulletin particularly during Foundation month of November.

The District Governor made a special visit to the club to present an award for coming second in the District during 1998-1999 for donations to the Foundation. We donated \$3275 or \$68 per member. This year the club donated \$1000 to Polio Plus and \$1000 to the Foundation.

One Member of our club, Peter Robinson, was made a Paul Harris Fellow in recognition of his service to Rotary and the community. Peter joined Rotary as a Charter Member of our club. He served as President in 1991-1992 and has been an active member on several Rotary Committees. Peter is a past president of Legacy and for many years has participated in the annual "Outback Bash" touring Australia and raising a large amount of money for charity and needy children.

Overseas Representatives

Our Cub is interested in encouraging and supporting Australian representation overseas (particularly augmenting group study/overseas students). The Club was able to contribute financial assistance to Elizabeth Patterson (marine scientist from Point Lonsdale) to attend the International People's Project in Brazil to be involved with Environmental Education workshops and fieldwork.

On her return, Elizabeth presented a well illustrated talk about the project, environmental education and the Children's International Summer Villages organisation. She has also expressed an interest regarding the 2001-2002 Rotary Foundation Ambassadorial Scholarships.

Equipment to Zimbabwe Hospital

This continuing project (in association with the Rotary Club of Mutare, Zimbabwe) to supply and install washing equipment to the Murambinda Mission Hospital has experienced further delays in completion. The existing approved contribution from the Ocean Grove Rotary Club of A\$3000 (to create a total amount of US\$8819 through the process of Matching Grants) is awaiting final confirmation through the Trustees at Rotary Headquarters in Evanston, USA. Difficulties have been experienced by constantly changing currency rates, political problems in Zimbabwe and, finally, a recent change in personnel handling these projects at Evanston. The completion of this project should occur within the latter half of 2000.

The 1999/2000 season was a great success, with gross revenue topping \$15,000 and the net profit up by more than 50% on the previous year. For the second season in a row, none of our eight markets was interrupted by bad weather and we experienced record crowds, with approximate total attendance exceeding 25,000.

Four of the markets were sellouts with 100 or more stalls, and Easter Monday produced the absolute maximum of 106- reduced from 155 applicants. The average was 90 at each market Our car parking team squeezed 8059 cars into Kingston Park including the almost unbelievable total of 1460 on Easter Monday.

The raffle (with goods entirely donated by John and Prue Webb of Wallington Mitre 10) returned proceeds of almost \$2600 - up from \$1415 in the previous season.

But these figures don't tell the real success story of our market. That revolves around the input by the members of this Club. We couldn't do without the placement and recovery of our road signs and witches hats by Eric and Rod, the sale of tickets to stallholders by Tony, the manning of the gate from 7.30 am by Dennis, and the cheerful and efficient work of the raffle ticket vendors and the car-parkers.


