## Environment Service Report

This has been a busy and productive year for the Environment Committee. Below is a summary of the projects undertaken this Rotary year:

- Completed revegetation project at Ocean Grove Lookout in September with assistance of the Bellarine Catchment Network and the City of Greater Geelong. Thanks to Barwon Water for \$4000 grant. Monthly maintenance checks continue to be conducted.
- Currently involved in Nature Strip Garden project with Ocean Grove Coastcare. Ocean Grove Rotary members have been assisting with mulch deliveries to the sites and, in some cases, assisting with planting. Thanks to Lisa and Harry for storing mulch and loading trailers and Andy and Ros for caring for the plants prior to delivery to sites.
- Maintenance of 100 trees continues monthly.
- Ongoing association with Bellarine Catchment Network. A member from Rotary Club of Ocean Grove attends network meetings. Members can participate in activities which are available on BCN Environmental Volunteering Calendar.
- Collection of bottle tops and blister packs for recycling continues.
- City of Geelong released a Draft Plan for Nature earlier this year. We have been in touch via email with a representative, Jeanette Spittle, several times to ask if she could come and speak at a meeting as we are keen to be involved. No reply as yet.
- Request from Our Lady Star of the Sea for assistance with their Kitchen Garden Program which is held on a Thursday each week. Unfortunately, there was limited interest from members to be involved.

## International Service Report

The Committee's aim was to continue international projects that give educational opportunities to overseas students to study and progress their education. Ten projects have been completed within the budget of \$15000.00:

- **Cambodia:** A four-year project supporting one student – Chengheang, studying through the “Cambodia Rural Student Trust” in Seim Reap. Cost per year \$3000.00. Total cost \$12,000.00. During this time, four RCOG members visited Chengheang at the Cambodia Rural Student Trust campus in Seim Reap. Members Janet Alexander and Alan Keyse visited in 2025 and Heather and Garry Willson in 2026. They were able to provide comprehensive report and photos for the members.
- **Birthing Kits:** 200 Birthing Kits, cost \$1000.00 were assembled by 14 Club members and were shipped to Lese Oalai, PNG.
- **ShelterBox Australia:** \$4500.00 was donated to this disaster relief project.
- **Papua New Guinea:** Health Workers - two workers completed a general health refresher course and one worker to completed a malaria prevention and treatment course. This project was funded via a District Grant and Club contribution.
- **Nepal:** \$1000.00 was donated through Sungabha Nepal- to sponsor 8 students to attend Bhairavel Secondary School – their school reports are very encouraging of their progress.
- **Operation Cleft Bangladesh:** Funded 3 operations @\$400.00 per operation = \$1200.00. Sponsored by Rotary Club of Box Hill Central Vic.
- **RARE:** Donated \$1000.00 to help cover the cost of sending containers to PNG.
- **RAWCS:** \$1000.00 towards a water project in Papua New Guinea. (37-2017-2018)
- **RAWCS:** \$1000.00 donated to Australian Rotarians against Malaria funding (62-2010-11)
- **Rotary Recycled Playground Project:** Members dismantled two sets of playground equipment in the City of Geelong and delivered them to RARE for shipment.

## Youth Service Report

The Youth Services Committee for 2025-2026 comprised Paul Brewster (Chair), Penny Broome, Lynne Carlson, Geoff Chandler, Jenny Clairs, Judy Greer, Tony Haines, Meredith O'Neill, Lyndy Stagg, Jenny Wright and Kath Venters.

As the work of the Youth Committee primarily focuses on schools, projects are mostly based on a school year rather than the Rotary year. So, this report is based on the second half of the 2025 school year and the first half of the 2026 school year.

It was again voted not to participate in the Rotary Youth Exchange programme this year – mostly due to uncertainty surrounding the rules and regulations both in Australia and Overseas which are constantly changing, becoming more restrictive and to some extent, confusing. It is worth noting that Lisa and Harry Hanley support an exchange programme outside the Rotary Youth Exchange Programme.

Our signature project remained the Rotary Junior Community Awards (RJCA) with 4 schools (Ocean Grove Primary, Surfside Primary, Our Lady Star of the Sea and Wallington) participating in 2026. Although we have spoken to Barwon Heads Primary, they have decided not to participate this year which is a blessing in disguise as we have the most ever students participating this year. Our RJCA awards night was an outstanding success with 8 students speaking of their experience whilst carrying out the Junior Community Awards. All school principals and year 6 co-ordinators were present. Again, parents of the presenters were invited to attend the dinner which they did together with a few siblings.

At the end of 2025, Transition bursaries (for students moving from year 6 to year 7) were again offered to all 8 primary schools in our area. A total of 18 bursaries at \$300 were awarded to assist with the expensive start to year 7 and very gratefully received by parents.

Two VCE scholarships of \$1,000 (one student commencing year 11 and the other continuing from year 11 to year 12) together with Three Roy Rose Memorial awards were presented at the Bellarine Secondary College presentation evening by Meredith O'Neill.

A proposed donation of \$2,000 to the Drop In Youth Programme at the Bellarine Community and Training Hub was deferred due to closure of the hub but will be reconsidered when the hub re-opens.

Our commitment to supporting students from the area served by our Club who participate in the Barwon Institute of Sport programme has continued. It is recognised that this programme covers not only training in a particular sport but also goal setting, personal development, media studies and so on. From this point of view, it reflects the RYLA programme for which we had no applicants. We believe this is mainly due to the need for participants to take a week off from their studies or work which is becoming increasingly difficult. The Barwon Institute of Sport programme spreads the studies throughout the year which makes it more appropriate.

This year we have no local applicants for the Defying the Drift (a week long residential course at Longerenong Agricultural College) but have been in touch with the organisers to try to identify applicants where we can support another Rotary Club who cannot afford the registration.

We are currently looking at supporting the Deakin University Science/Engineering Challenge directly rather than looking for participation from Bellarine Secondary College. Unfortunately, the Marine Discovery Centre Science Programme was not able to continue this year. It is no longer part of the Santos Science experience and Deakin have informed us that due to lack of funding they are unable to deliver the programme. We are investigating other avenues for support as this programme is valuable and should continue if possible.

Several other projects such as debating, theatre, music and cooking were listed for investigation, but we ran out of time!!!

We are fortunate that all members of our dedicated team have confirmed their desire to continue their participation in the Youth Committee and in particular Lyndy Stagg for agreeing to take over as chair of the committee next Rotary year.

Thanks to all members of the Committee for their professional approach and untiring efforts to bring about successful outcomes for our projects in 2025-2026. We have not only enjoyed the projects themselves but also the camaraderie which makes service fun and gratifying.

In June 2026 there were 46 Paul Harris Fellows, many of whom had multiple recognitions. There were 9 Paul Harris Society Members, and 2 major donors.

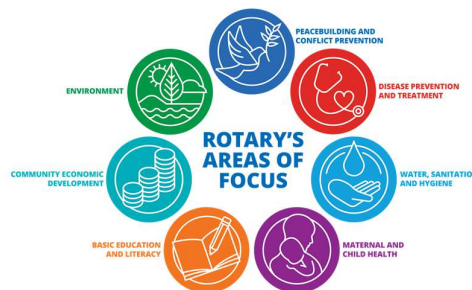

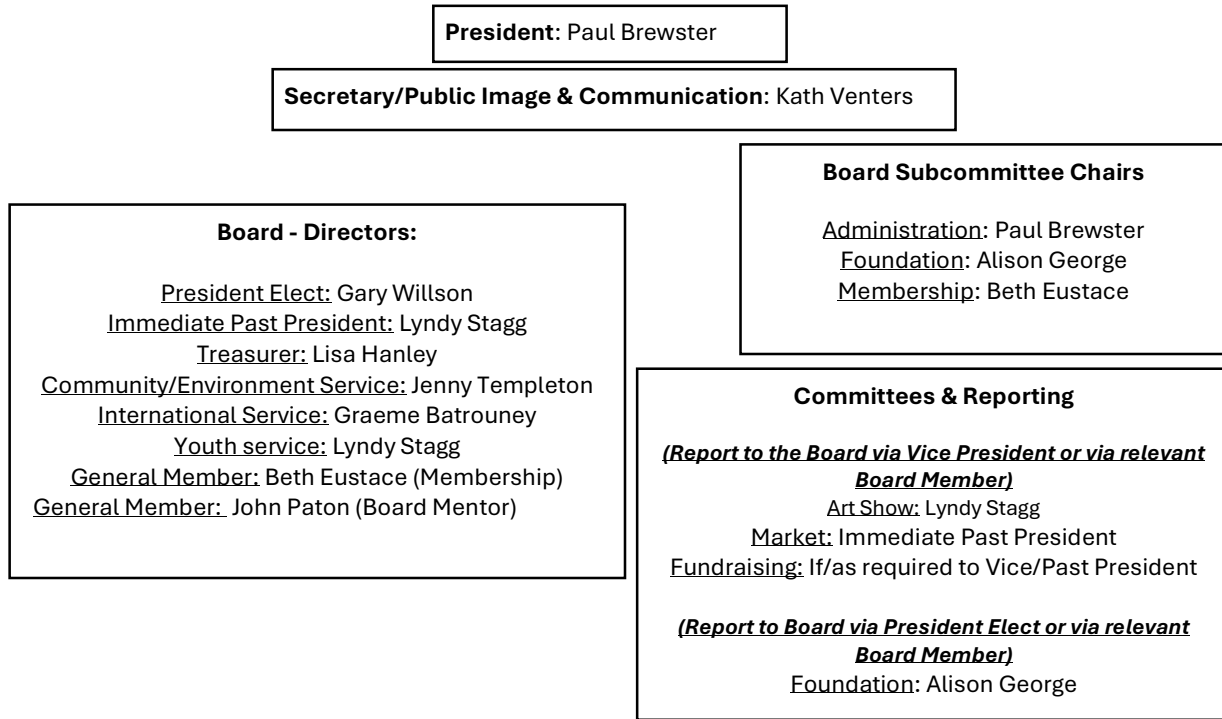
