

Alex worked to investigate how technology could be used to help Venezuelan migrants (and returning Columbians) to find quality jobs, using technology. His group developed a technology based process to assist the Government to help organisations to contact/hire potential employees in a reliable manner as well s providing them with reliable and accurate information. It helped to address issues around using popular social networking processes such as WhatsApp and Facebook which often distributed false/misleading information.

It also provided the Government with useful data to potentially develop further beneficial changes.

A tourist visiting the area drives through town, stops at the motel, and lays a \$100 bill on the desk saying he wants to inspect the on rooms to pick one for the night. As soon as he walks out, the motel owner grabs the bill and runs into town to pay his debt to the butcher.

ROTARY PROJECTS ONLINE WEBINAR, 6 MAY 2020

This is available online but runs for an hour. Below is a summary. Any links will be forwarded once they are received from Zone 8.

Rotary Co-ordinator for Zone 8 (Australia, New Zealand and Pacific Islands), Tim Moore organised a webinar on Zoom on 6 May to highlight projects that were engaging clubs - both within their membership and outwards to the community. Below is a summary of the 5 projects on the webinar.

ROTARY CLUB OF SOUTHBANK (Melbourne): Jasmine Dhillon found ways to create handmade facemarks, mainly to distribute to the homeless in her area. She will be sending information on how to make the masks and I will forward them when received. These are non-medical grade masks and a disclaimer needs to be given with the masks to reflect that.

ROTARY CLUB OF FRANKSTON NORTH: David Hanlon described how a club member offered fitness lessons online to members of the community. They organised a \$5 ticket cost which would cover a household through Eventbrite, with the money going to a local hospital project. Their next project will be an online trivia night once technical things can be overcome - maybe via Zoom with Cahoot on the side. (Don't ask me - Rod Bush might have the answer).

ROTORACT CLUB OF ADELAIDE UNIVERSITY: Lenard Sciancalepore cranked up an online cooking class, initially for club members and then started finding queries from people elsewhere. There are a number of international students contributing recipes for dishes from their countries. Maybe a cookbook one day. *In the meantime, I hope to have a link to his cooking class on Zoom on 16 May at 12.30 EST.*

ROTARY CLUBS OF ROWVILLE-LYSTERFIELD (Rajif) AND BAYSWATER (Neil): Their Art Show this year was suddenly put in jeopardy by the virus regulations and, with only 2 weeks' notice, managed to create a virtual Knox Art Show. This show has been going for 40 years and they were reluctant to stop. Artists were asked to submit a photo of their painting and from this, a selection was made for the virtual show. Instead of the show running for 2 days, it ran online for 2 weeks and although only two-thirds of the previous year's revenue was received, the clubs believe it was well worth it and they were able to distribute funds as usual, though somewhat smaller in \$s. Even if virus restrictions are lifted, think about doing both in the future. *(I haven't tried the link yet but they recommended Googling gallery 247. If it doesn't work, wait till I get more links from the Zone. An interesting part of their flyer for their regular art show is a cartoon in the corner by WEG. We have a local cartoonist Roy - maybe worth a phone call Art Show Committee?*)

ROTARY SATELLITE CLUB (NZ) OF GULF HARBOUR/ARMY BAY: (This is the North Island on the east coast, north of Auckland with a high proportion of the residents being retired. 3 clubs were involved but rather than promoting individual clubs, they carried out their project under the Rotary banner.). This began with a desire, in NZ's severe restrictions, to help the vulnerable with errands, grocery shopping or just checking in to see if people were needing help in any way. Flyers were printed and distributed by volunteers (not sure how they recruited them as they weren't all in Rotary). Volunteer badges were made and the clubs liaised with police to let them know what was happening. People could provide a grocery list which was then purchased, the receipt placed in the bag with items delivered to the door, with a request to reimburse Rotary and if possible include a small donation. So far \$2,100 has been raised.

If you are interested in what happens in a wider sphere than just our District 9780, check out Zone 8 on Rotary on the Move. Good stuff on there. Went to their conference in Christchurch last year. As soon as I get links to the above, I'll pass them on to the Board and general membership.
