lan's story is that he was born in the U.K. but was not happy with the quality of life there. He left Leeds with his wife and three children and decided to go to New Zealand. There he set up a business, his kids grew up and his wife had a significant job in publication. But they wanted a change and decided to move to the public sector to do something useful. Ian joined New Zealand Corrections as a probation officer. This could be traumatic, dealing with hardened criminals, gang members and violence. However, he could also work with individuals who were ready to make a change in their lives. They then

decided to move to Geelong and lan joined the parole team. He has found this very rewarding.

Ian later moved to the community service team. There he managers a team of field officers who assist those sentenced to community service work orders to build life skills. Often these people have other issues but they have been able to get some good outcomes. They need partners and engage with community organisations to get participants satisfying work roles. These people do not pose a serious threat to society and the



aim is to create a pathway to get them back on track and able to make a meaningful contribution to society. Some are reoffenders but they can always be given another go. Individuals are on different journeys and have different capacities to change at any point in time.

Is there room in Rotary's projects and services to give such people a chance? Even small gestures will help. Australia is very quick to incarcerate and many of these people can be managed in the community.
