General Information:

Help was also requested for the BBQ at the Pt Lonsdale market. A roster sheet was circulated.

Those unfortunates who have been smitten with the COVID 19 virus are managing with help from Barwon Health and neighbors. Geoff Ford is home but feeling very lethargic.

Members were given boxes of shortbread to be given to Senior Citizens in lieu of a Christmas dinner.

<u>Jodie Lowe</u> spoke to members about her experiences as an Exchange Student in South Africa in 1989. The whole experience

has made a great deal of difference to her life and she is sure it has made her the person she has become. Jodie emphasized that the Club should feel very proud of its participation in this program and what it has done for her and other participants throughout the world. She is currently a member of RI Central Launceston.



Guest Speaker: Peter Kavenagh. Peter joined Rotary in 2005 and became involved with Shelter Box in 2006. The Shelter Box Project was set up in Southern Cornwall by a private company in 1999.

Shelter Box is an international disaster relief organization which exists to shelter families after disaster strikes,



and to provide safety, shelter and security in the midst of chaos. Tools to enable people to rebuild their homes and transform their lives. Families come first. At the moment there are around 85 million people around the world who have been made homeless by natural disaster or conflict. Unfortunately, as recently as 2017 only about one in five families received the support so desperately needed so the work never stops.

Shelter Boxes contain a tent which can provide accommodation for at least 10 people, a shovel, pots and pans, small selection of tools, tarpaulins, hardwearing rope, water containers, blankets, a water filtration system, a LuminAID light and a mosquito net.

ShelterKits are also provided with items that are customized to meet the needs of each community, including building materials and articles to assist with food production. Solar lights are also provided. They are lightweight and float on water and last up to 16 hours on one charge.

The Shelter Box Response Team is made up of nearly 200 dedicated people who are trained to assess needs and assist in the use of the equipment in disaster areas.

Before boxes are deployed government response is considered, numbers of people needing help, the type of aid needed and the length of time it will be needed. Speed of self-recovery and local capacity as well as involvement of other aid agencies are also considered. Safety is vital as is the speed and efficiency of delivery. The organization is still small and resources are limited so partnerships with other aid agencies are made where possible.

The partnership and support of Rotary International is vital as this collaboration provides information sharing and of course fundraising. Support has been provided to over I million people during 310 deployments in 100 countries in the year 2000.

When communities have lost everything else Shelter Box unconditionally gives them something they can call their own and helps people turn despair into hope.


The tents last for about 2-4 years and each box costs approximately \$1000. Some governments assist with the transportation and delivery of the equipment. Peter illustrated his talk with short films showing the joy and many ways these donations and real assistance in times of chaos have made lives recoverable and livable again. Over the years RI Ocean Grove has supported this organization and no doubt will continue to do so.




