Guest Speakers: Blake Hillebrand and Jeremy Finkelstein from "Baru Threads."

Blake has responsibility for Design and Marketing. He grew up near Dimmicks Beach near Blairgowrie. He has a keen interest in sustainability and design. He is currently completing a Bachelor of Architecture at RMIT University. Whilst researching sustainable industry for a Uni project, he began to understand the extent of THE REPORT OF THE PARTY OF THE

pollution that new trends in fast fashion produce. This became the inspiration for sustainable products.

Jeremy has responsibility for Manufacturing and management. He has fond memories of the Great Ocean Road and its beautiful landscapes. He has always appreciated the restorative effects that nature has to offer, which led to his pursuit of a degree in Horticulture and informed him as a disability support worker. For him, getting outdoors and into nature is about improving mental health and wellness. Baru is about the challenge to help others improve themselves, as well as the planet.

The organization is 2 years 3 months old and it started with in a tutoring session where mental health difficulties were discussed The discussion included how important outdoor activities were especially as 20% + of young people with increasing anxiety levels and depression live in urban areas where experience and opportunity to just be in outdoor environments was becoming more difficult. The need to have these areas available is being researched especially at Stanford University.


To enable people to experience the outdoors they realized funding was necessary, hence the creation and manufacture of fabrics which were sustainable and appealing to younger people was created. Fabrics had to be made using less water and made from recycled material. They commenced with making shorts and T shirts. A website was built and focused on selling merchandise at local markets. They hope to sell goods to stockists but keeping up with demand is difficult, especially as both young men are studying.

They had to learn the process of recycling and discuss with the makers and factories how they might proceed. A video was shown showing how plastic bottles were transformed into fabric. At present design is local and manufacture is global. Goals set for the process are generated in Australia and transferred to international realities. Ethical employment, employee benefits and empowerment are followed. At present the raw material is sent to India and the finished product is returned.

In the future they hope to increase sales online, attend more markets and local distributors. New products are being investigated as is cost reduction.


Publicity amongst friends about the fabric and items made from correctly recycled material is very important. Support for each other is also important. Of course the pandemic has had an effect on their progress. Jeremy and Blake aim to produce sustainable clothes that look good and get Aussies out to big skies, sandy tracks and rugged shores. They want to have 'clothes that are best for you and your mind so they don't just inspire escape, they make it happen.

This venture is regarded as a social enterprise as it is hoped that 80% of the profits are used to fund young people to spend more time outdoors
